NOVEMBER SPEAKER: MR. WILLIAM Y. ARCURI



Born on August 7, 1947 in Tallahassee, Florida and raised in an Air Force Family, Bill Arcuri attended the USAF Academy Preparatory School prior to attending West Point. He graduated from the United States Military Academy at West Point in June 1970 and was commissioned a second lieutenant in the US Air Force. Bill attended Graduate Pilot Training at Moody AFB, GA and received his pilot wings in July 1971. He was then assigned to the 744th Bomb Squadron, Beale AFB, CA as a SAC B52G Co-Pilot.

Mr. Arcuri flew the B52G from Anderson AFB, Guam in support of Line Backer I/II from May 1972 to December 1972. He was flying his 44th mission when his aircraft was shot down on December 20, 1972 over Yin Ven, North Vietnam and he was captured and interned at the Hoa Lo Prison known as the "Hanoi Hilton". As a result of injuries, Mr. Arcuri was released in the first group of POWs on Feb-

ruary 12, 1973. He later upgraded to Aircraft Commander in the B52G and served as an Officer Controller in the SAC Command Post at Beale AFB. Arcuri resigned from the USAF in July 1976 as a Captain. He worked as a System Engineer for Ross Perot's EDS and then Perot Systems until he retired in 2011.

His awards and decorations include the Distinguished Flying Cross with Valor Device, the Bronze Star with Valor Device, the Purple Heart, the Air Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster and the POW Medal. He continues to be very active with Veteran organizations including Project 425—Vietnam Huey Crewmember, Forgotten Soldiers Outreach, Inc. Board Member, Renewal Coalition Jupiter/Tequesta, Wounded Veteran Commemorative Project—West Point Class of 1970.

He is also a Trustee for the Friends of Andersonville which is the site of the National POW Museum.

w/Valor Distinguished **Flying Cross** Citation reads: First Lieutenant William Y Arcuri distinguished himself by heroism while participating in aerial flight as a B-52 Copilot near Hanoi, North Vietnam, on 20 December 1972. On that date, while engaged in one of the largest conventional bombing raids ever amassed in the recent history of aerial warfare, Lieutenant Arcuri was forced to bail out over hostile territory due to significant battle damage to his aircraft as the result of extremely heavy hostile fire. Lieutenant Arcuri and his crew were in quest of massed supplies, communications equipment, and transportation lines in order to eliminate the aggressor's capacity to initiate an offensive, and, despite receiving heavy battle damage and incurring grave personal danger, Lieutenant Arcuri and his crew were able to destroy the target before being forced to abandon their aircraft. The outstanding heroism and selfless devotion to duty displayed by Lieutenant Arcuri reflect great credit upon himself and the United States Air Force.

LEGISLATIVE LOWDOWN For more information, visit MOAA National's Legislative Action Center!

Greetings to all of MOAA's Tampa Chapter members and those aspiring to join our great chapter. I thank you all for your continued support of MOAA's legislative agenda. As mentioned a few weeks ago at our October luncheon, your engagement has been both acknowledged and impactful. Your voice is shaking the Hill. Let's continue to sound off by closing the year with a large and powerful wave of letters to our legislators that address the critical issues MOAA continues to tackle. Of which, there are two top issues MOAA's leaders are asking for your support and immediate action this month.

The first critical concern remains the approval of the FY2020 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA). Beyond authorizing over \$733 billion in defense spending, the Act contains three embedded provisions we must follow closely:

the provision addressing the "widow's tax," wherein survivors of deceased servicemembers must forfeit part or all of their purchased SBP annuity when they are awarded the VA's Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC);

the provision seeking to stop the proposed cut of nearly 18,000 medical billets, roughly 20% of our military medicine positions, that will undoubtedly impact health care on the battlefield and at our local facilities: and

the legislation focusing on the myriad issues with privatized military housing.

You can make a difference by logging on today and submitting a prepared message to your Congressional Representative. It is easy to do. Here is the link: http:// takeaction.moaa.org/app/write-a-letter?6&engagementId=502302.

The second issue is the consolidation of the Commissaries and the Military Exchanges as recommended in the study conducted by the Reform Management Group, titled "Study to Determine the Feasibility of Consolidation of the Defense Resale Entities" and dated December 4, 2018.

You can read Sections 631 and 632 of the FY2020 NDAA for more detailed information at the following: https:// www.congress.gov/bill/116th-congress/house-bill/2500/text#toc-H4EB39C2CA39B406DAF7A9B0A3B0AA4B0. Succinctly, these sections call for the Government Accounting Office to conduct an independent review of the business case analysis supportive of merging the Defense Commissary Agency and Military Exchanges and requires the Secretary of Defense to submit to the congressional defense committees a report regarding management practices of military commissaries and exchanges not later than 180 days after the enactment of the FY2020 NDAA.


FCOC Convention 2020!

The Marines Corps birthday will take place on Sunday, November 10, 2019. The Marine Corps turns 244 years

The birthday itself was formally recognized in 1921 at the behest of Major General John Lejeune, who ordered November 10, 1775 to be officially recognized service-wide as the Marine Corps birthday.

The origins go back to the Revolutionary War in October of 1775. At that time the Continental Congress developed an official plan to use Marines to oversee a mission to intercept ammunition shipments from Britain. This, and a November resolution to create an official standing Marine Corps force, were key in building what eventually became the modern U.S. Marine Corps. Thus 10 November, 1775, the day the Continental Marines were created serves as the official Marine Corps birthday.

VISITING FAMILY MEMBERS

Since the beginning of Operation Iraqi Freedom and Operation Enduring Freedom, the James A. Haley Veterans' Hospital has had a marked increase in the number of wounded and injured active duty members referred for treatment. Their Spinal Cord Injury and Comprehensive Rehabilitation Units have treated some of the most severely injured service members who have been in combat in these operations. The average stay for the injured is 45 days. Many of the families travel from all over the country and must provide for themselves while staying here in the Tampa Bay area.

The month of November provides us with numerous opportunities to be thankful for our lives, for men and women who serve or have served in the uniforms of our nation, and, of course, for the special day set aside "Thanksgiving."

On the 10th we honor the 244th anniversary of the establishment of the United States Marine Corps. Again, this month there is a verse of the hymn "Eternal Father, Strong to Save" for the Corps: "Eternal Father, grant, we pray, to all Marines, both night and day, the courage, honor, strength, and skill their land to serve, thy law fulfill; be Thou the shield forevermore from every peril to the Corps."

The 11th gives us the opportunity to honor those who have served and are still with us. I remember from my youth when this day was called Armistice Day as a way of commemorating the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month in 1918 when the armistice between Germany and the allied nations was signed ending World War 1. In 1954 it officially became Veterans Day. Then its celebration got bounced around a bit with Congress in 1968 moving it to the 4th Monday of October and then, thankfully, in 1975 President Ford signed a law moving it back to November 11th. So, on November 11, 2019 we honor, give thanks, and pledge our support for all who have served.

The 28th is set aside as a day of national thanksgiving officially recognized by Presidents Washington, Adams and Madison and then there was a twenty-seven year absence until 1863 when President Lincoln's Proclamation set the 4th Thursday of November as Thanksgiving. Since then every President has issued a Thanksgiving Proclamation.

Most worshipping congregations appropriately sing an 1844 hymn written by an Anglican priest, "Come, Ye Thankful People, Come." Henry Alford wrote: "Come, ye thankful people, come, raise the song of harvest home; all is safely gathered in ere the winter storms begin; God, our maker, doth provide for our wants to be supplied; come to God's own temple, come, raise the song of harvest home."

Let's all take advantage this month to say "thank you" on these special days set aside for commemoration and celebration.

Sen. Rick Scott Applauds Decision to Keep Coast Guard Contract in Florida's Panhandle

WASHINGTON, D.C. – Today, Senator Rick Scott released the statement below after the announcement that the U.S. Coast Guard will grant an extension to Panama City-based Eastern Shipbuilding's Offshore Patrol Cutter contract. Eastern Shipbuilding requested this extension following the devastating impacts of Hurricane Michael to its shipbuilding facilities and available labor last year.

Senator Rick Scott said, "Since Hurricane Michael hit last year, I've been fighting to make sure Florida families and businesses have everything they need to fully recover and get back to their normal lives. I applaud the Coast Guard's decision to continue the Offshore Patrol Cutter project in Panama City as the community keeps working to rebuild from the storm. This is incredible news for the local economy and the many families who depend on these jobs, and ensures the Coast Guard has the resources it needs to protect our national security."

Earlier this year, Senator Scott and Senator Marco Rubio introduced the Restore Coast Guard Capabilities Act to give the U.S. Coast Guard the authority to take into account the impacts of Hurricane Michael to modify this contract with Panama City-based Eastern Shipbuilding. Senator Scott also worked with Senator Rubio and his colleagues on the Senate Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation to include their proposal in the Coast Guard Reauthorization Act of 2019, passed by the Committee in July.

WASHINGTON – The Department of Homeland Security, after extensive analysis by the U.S. Coast Guard and further review by a Contract Adjustment Board chaired by the Department's Deputy Under Secretary for Management, has granted limited extraordinary contract relief to Eastern Shipbuilding Group (ESG) for the Offshore Patrol Cutter (OPC) contract under the authority of Public Law (P.L.) 85-804.

ESG submitted a request in June 2019, for extraordinary contract relief after their shipbuilding facilities sustained significant damage resulting from Hurricane Michael, a Category 5 storm, in October 2018.

After review of the request for relief, Acting Secretary of Homeland Security Kevin K. McAleenan made the decision to grant extraordinary contract relief limited to the first four hulls on the basis that ESG's performance on the OPC contract is vital to the national defense.

P.L. 85-804 was enacted in 1958 and extended to DHS through Presidential Executive Order in 2003. Under this law, an existing contract may be amended or modified when such actions are necessary to facilitate the national defense. The Coast Guard will immediately transition to a follow-on competitive contract for the remaining OPC program of record.

The OPC program remains one of the Department's highest acquisition priorities. This decision will ensure critical capabilities for our national and homeland security, and delivery for service to the American public as expeditiously and responsibly as possible.

Defense Official Builds Case for Creating Space Force Oct. 11, 2019 | By David Vergun Read this story online here



The U.S. military and the commercial sector rely heavily on spaceenabled capabilities, and the Defense Department must protect those assets and maintain U.S. superiority in the space domain, the deputy assistant secretary of defense for space policy said.

Stephen L. Kitay spoke as part of a panel discussion at an AFCEA luncheon in Arlington, Va. AFCEA is a nonprofit organization that serves as a forum for advancing professional knowledge and relationships in communications, information technology, intelligence and security.

"U.S. interest in space is expanding, and the threats are correspondingly expanding," Kitay said, noting that China launched an anti-satellite weapon against one of its own satellites in 2007 to

demonstrate that it can knock out satellites. In December, he noted, Russia boasted that it has a ground-based laser that can take out satellites. Cyber threats also figure into the equation. "The threat is real and here," he said.

DOD is no longer viewing space as a support function, but as a warfighting domain -- a domain of potential crisis and conflict, he

said. The department advocates for the creation of a sixth branch of the armed forces to meet that mission, he added. "We believe we have a strategic imperative to create a Space Force," he said. The Space Force would unify space-related activities within DOD, he explained.

Kitay noted that the Air Force, which used to be part of the Army, became a separate service in 1947 because it had become clear that in addition to supporting ground forces, air power also is necessary to maintaining air superiority.

In similar fashion, he said, the nation needs to maintain space superiority and protect freedom of operations in that domain. "Future operations will likely start or extend into space," he added, "and we have to be ready for that." A space-centric identity and culture would be another important aspect of creating a sixth military branch, Kitay said.





Funding legislation for creating a Space Force is pending in Congress. Kitay said additional money would go toward supporting the warfighter from the space domain, not toward adding more layers of bureaucracy.

Much of the Space Force could be built from existing structure within the services and DOD, he said. For example, the Space Development Agency most likely would be merged into the new service at an appropriate time after the Space Force is stood up. Some space assets residing in each of the services and the department would not be incorporated into the Space Force, he said, citing the National Reconnaissance Office as an example.

U.S. Space Command, which activated in August, would remain as a combatant command, focused on warfighting aspects, he said.

Military Exchanges Extinguish Vape Sales OCT. 15, 2019 | BY C. TODD LOPEZ Read this story online here

The Army and Air Force Exchange Service and the Navy Exchange have temporarily stopped selling vape-related products. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention statistics report that 1,299 lung injury cases and 26 deaths are related to ecigarette or vaping product use.

AAFES temporarily removed vape-related products from its shelves Sept. 30. Navy Exchange Service Command temporarily removed products from NEX retail shelves and directed NEX concessionaires and vendors to temporarily discontinue the sale of vaping products after Oct. 1.

Vape products, including e-cigs, e-cigarettes, vapes and e-hookahs, are electronic nicotine delivery devices that heat a sometimes flavored nicotine-infused liquid into a vapor that users inhale. In recent months, there have been reports of illnesses and deaths that are believed to be associated with the use of vape products.

"The vapor that users inhale can contain ultrafine particles, carcinogens, volatile organic compounds and heavy metals," said Public Health Service Capt. Kimberly

Elenberg, director of Total Force Fitness for the undersecretary of defense for personnel and readiness. "Vaping is not harmless, and researchers are still trying to understand the long-term impacts and health effects from inhaling the vapor."

NEXCOM officials said Navy exchanges carried two vape-related products in the tobacco sale area of their stores. Those products, "ecigarettes," have been temporarily removed from shelves. Additionally, NEXCOM directed Navy Exchange concessionaires and vendors to temporarily discontinue the sale of vaping products in any NEX location.

AAFES officials said their stores' offering of vape-related products already was limited, and that its exchanges had already stopped offering flavored vape liquids because of Food and Drug Administration concerns with the appeal of the products to underage customers. By the end of September, AAFES had removed products from two manufacturers from its shelves.

While proponents of vape products argue that vaping is safer than using traditional tobacco products such as cigarettes, Elenberg said it's actually too early to tell. "E-cigarettes generally contain less chemicals compared to traditional products like cigarettes, but since the long-term effects of vaping are unknown and not understood, there is not enough information at this time to make a determination on whether it is safer or healthier than other tobacco products," she said.

Even if the ingestion of nicotine is deemed safer through vaping than through traditional products, nicotine itself is still a dangerous chemical, said Dr. Donald Shell, the director of disease prevention, disease management and population health policy and oversight in the Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Health Services Policy and Oversight.

"Nicotine is an extremely addictive, naturally occurring toxic chemical derived from the tobacco plant that affects the nervous system and the heart," Shell said. "Nicotine is a teratogen, as it is capable of causing birth defects. Other developmental or reproductive toxicities associated with the use of nicotine are unknown."



While current information regarding nicotine as a carcinogen is inconclusive, Shell said, nicotine is highly addictive, and young adults and adolescents are especially vulnerable to its addictive properties.


